Well done also to the Upper II students of Serena, Araliya, Mariam, Tereza, Christina and Sneha who raced the 2km distance.

Serena smashed the entire field, winning overall by 5 seconds in a time of 7.52 with



Araliya finishing 8th overall, which was also the 2nd girl home, giving an Abbey one and two. As a team, these 6 students finished in 6th place out of 59 schools, and all those ahead of them were mixed teams. A great result, and fantastic to achieve some competition in lockdown, even if it was virtual. The PE depsartment wonder if anyone else might join in the running "bug" over half term, maybe if the weather warms up?

Depending on which route Amelia takes, she does around 7000-9000 steps from her house to the woods and back again.


It is a really great way to get away from screens and remote learning, whilst also getting plenty of fresh air, exercise and giving your brain a break. Amelia, Upper III

Upper IV Artwork inspired by Paul Giovanopoulos

Paul Giovanopoulos' artwork is defined by complex investigation of simple objects. His original vision involved a carefully composed repetitive grid of panels as the base of a painting.

Giovanopoulos then interpreted each panel, transforming the object within through "visual signatures" from art history, cultural icons, and concept.

In making art this way, he became at once creator, collector and curator of each canvas.

Upper IV art students have been combining all of this information into an artist study page of the artist 'Paul Giovanopoulos' who takes ideas and concepts of other artists and applies it to his own work, For example - a Pop art Mona Lisa, then a surrealism Mona Lisa etc.
